

Good news as we all return



What do I do if I think we could have Coronavirus?



Here is our weekly reminder of the guidance about Covid19 and the symptoms. When should you keep your child home and seek a test? How can you tell if your child just has a cold, or whether it might be coronavirus?

It is recommended that pupils and staff who feel unwell, get tested if:

They develop one or more of the main coronavirus symptoms: a high temperature; a new, continuous cough; or the loss or change of their sense of taste or smell;

If a child is tested because they are unwell, they should stay off school until they receive a result. As in any year, as schools go back, children may pick up common colds or feel unwell with a sore throat, stomach upset or a headache. These children may need to stay off school and parents/carers should call their GP or dial 111 to seek medical advice if they are concerned about their child's health.

Art Competition

As we return to school, it is important for us to remember that we still have to socially distance and very important that we continue to wash our hands.

- We would like you to design a really eye-catching poster for us to display around school. You could use paints, colouring pencils, felt pens, collage or even the computer to design your poster.
- You need to include the ideas on the example - wet, get soap, scrub, rinse and dry. Don't copy the poster - design your own.
- You can email your poster to Mr Pugh or Mrs Robinson, drop it off at school or bring it in on March 8th, when we all return.
- Mr Pugh will choose 2 winners from each class who will all receive a prize and have their posters copied and displayed around school.
